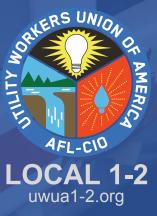
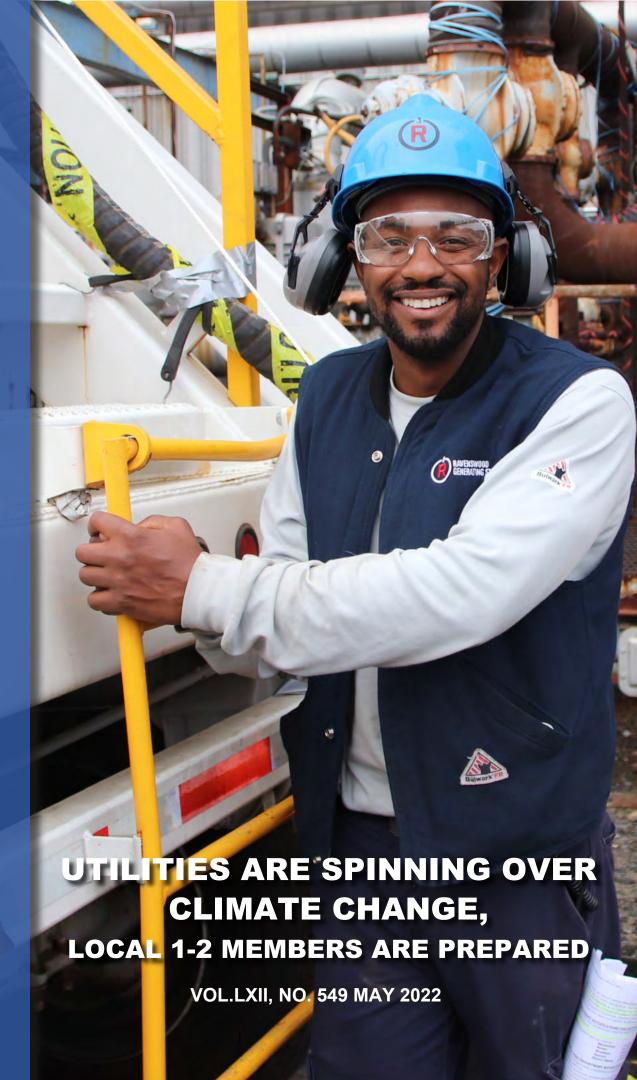

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Brothers and Sisters, Once again, our May Membership Meeting will be held virtually because of Covid protocols. If everything gets better from here on out, we will join together in person in September. Fingers crossed.

I have instituted some changes in the way this Record looks and have tried to add some features which I hope will interest you.

Since our last Membership Meeting, the Union has been busy looking to the future as utilities come under extreme pressure to embrace and get online with "green" sources of energy production. It's becoming ever more ironic that New York State shut down Indian Point which produced 25% of the region's energy without emitting any greenhouse gases.

Right now, much of what we are doing is positioning Local 1-2 to reap the skilled jobs required to operate wind, solar and other forms of clean energy generation and delivery.

As a member of the Climate Action Council committee on jobs, we do have a voice as the State and New York City are looking for quick fixes to get out of using natural gas, oil and coal to generate power. We all know this is pretty much fantasy in the near future, but it is coming and we need to be ready. Certainly, our employers are looking down that road to ensure profits. The Bosses don't care about protecting us, the people who will generate those profits, as they don't much want a Union around. One example is DTE out in Michigan which, as they gear up for wind power, are giving UWUA Members a rough time and trying to make THAT non-Union work. And we all know what non-Union means: lower wages, less safety and no job protection.

Here at home, National UWUA President James Slevin and I have been meeting with Equinor on offshore wind jobs. We met with Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney and the owners of Ravenswood on transitioning that facility to a clean energy center.

It is so frustrating meeting with elected officials and climate policy makers when we know the very nuts and bolts that are needed to keep the lights on, yet their attitudes are not realistic in implementing the work that really needs to be done. They still have the view that plugging into Canada will do the trick. We'll tell them 'I told you so' when there is no other option than to turn to Utility Workers to get the job done.

There is a lot of action going on around us from de-commissioned work at Indian Point to starting up contract talks with Eastern Gen to making sure our employers live up to our agreements and don't seek to use the Covid pandemic as an excuse to mess with the Membership. We will continue to do all we can to protect you and your jobs. That is why you have a Union.

These days all the Big Picture thinking about climate change and our energy future appears always to leave out of the equation the men and women who will perform the actual work. We will keep reminding them that without you, the lights definitely will go out.

Remember, the Boss is not your friend, never has been, never will be. Stick with the Union!

still contracting Covid, and despite a high rate of vaccination, Covid and its mutating strains keep everyone on edge. So, it is up to us at Local 1-2 to keep health and safety at the forefront for our Brothers and Sisters because the companies that employ us care only for profit.

Like President Shillitto, Local 1-2 is always elbowing its way to the table to ensure that when the elected officials and policy gurus go about transitioning

to renewable sources of energy, they hear us

loud and clear.

I represent you and your interests on the Decommissioning Panel for Indian Point. Scores of our Members remain at Indian Point working on the decommissioning for the new owners, while we are working on the panel to make sure we get the new energy jobs that are on the way and to see that the politicians in Albany don't blow another hole in the local economy.

It would be remiss to overlook that March was Women's History Month and that UWUA has a very active Women's Caucus that promotes women and their work here at Local 1-2, across all of UWUA, and for all women in the workplace. They are seeking to right the wrongs of gender discrimination in the modern workplace so that any woman is equal as any man in pay and in the ability to learn and move., to train and work in any title.

What all this comes down to is what each and every Member demands of an employer: Dignity and Respect. Don't forget, apathy is lethal.

We are well into year three of the Covid pandemic. As of this writing, cases are starting to rise again all over, especially here in New York. And it is at this same time as the new Covid variant is spreading that the Bosses are starting to require many of our Members to be "back to the office," and we hope a return to normalcy in all our lives. Other of our Members have been working in the field throughout this pandemic, in harm's way to make sure the lights stay on.

Whether in the office or working in the field, Members of Local 1-2 have always demonstrated their professionalism and rise to every occasion. The Bosses want us to be First

Responders in these situations; but when we demand to be treated like First Responders, the Bosses say we're just widgets that can be replaced; and forget all the sacrifices we made during these times of crisis.

Having it both ways seems to be the preference of our employers as President Shillitto points out in his column. But through this period we have been able to work with our employers so that Members can have flexibility in their work schedules if work from home is an option.

Yet, we continue to live under mandates, under increasingly dense rules for remote work and then even denser rules for back to the office and for continuing our work in the field. People are



PRESIDENT SHILLITTO'S TESTIMONY TO THE STATE CLIMATE ACTION COUNCIL IN MARCH

GOOD AFTERNOON

I AM JAMES SHILLITTO, PRESIDENT OF LOCAL 1-2, NEW YORK, UTILITY WORKERS UNION OF AMERICA, AFL-CIO. AS PRESIDENT, I REPRESENT MORE THAN 8,000 MEN AND WOMEN WHO WORK ACROSS 12 DIFFERENT COMPANIES IN THE UTILITY INDUSTRY, INCLUDING CON EDISON, AND INDIAN POINT, WHERE MY MEMBERS ARE NOW WORKING ON ITS LENGTHY DECOMMISSIONING.

AS A MEMBER OF THE CAC'S ADVISORY PANEL ON A "JUST TRANSITION" TO OUR CLEAN ENERGY FUTURE, I WOULD LIKE TO MAKE PUBLIC THE ITEMS I PRESS YOU TO ADOPT AS A SUBJECT MATTER EXPERT MEMBER OF THE PANEL.

BECAUSE YOUR MISSION CALLS FOR AN ENERGY TRANSITION THAT VALUES JOBS AS WELL AS THE ENVIRONMENT, I WILL POINT OUT AREAS THAT NEED MORE PRUDENT CONSIDERATION BEFORE LEAPING WILLY-NILLY INTO NEW FORMS OF ENERGY GENERATION.

THE FIRST SOBERING REALITY IS THAT NEW YORK STATE, LET ALONE OUR NATION, IS NOT ANYWHERE NEAR PREPARED TO JUMP OFF THE CURRENT GRID OF GAS, ELECTRIC, NUCLEAR AND HYDRO POWER GENERATION STRAIGHT TO WIND, SOLAR, THERMAL OR ANY OTHER WORTHY CLEAN ENERGY THAT WILL BE NEEDED IN THE COMING DECADES.

I HAVE NO PROBLEM ACKNOWLEDGING THAT WE ARE IN A CLIMATE CRISIS AND THAT IF OUR SOCIETY IS TO CONTINUE TO THRIVE, WE HAVE TO MOVE OUR ENERGY GENERATION TO CLEAN, RENEWABLE, EFFICIENT RESOURCES.

IN THE INTERIM - AN INTERIM, TO BE CLEAR, THAT WILL TAKE DECADES TO ACCOMPLISH - WE HAVE TO USE WHAT WE HAVE RIGHT NOW IN MORE EFFICIENT, CLEANER CAPACITIES. ONE OF THOSE CLEANER CAPACITIES IS TO USE OUR EXISTING GAS INFRASTRUCTURE TO DELIVER RNG AND GREEN HYDROGEN ENERGY, WHICH COULD GO A LONG WAY TO ADDRESS THE ASTRONOMICAL COSTS THAT WILL HIT CONSUMERS, WHILE WE TRANSITION. WE NEED TO PROVIDE POWER THROUGH EXISTING, CLEANER TECHNOLOGY UNTIL THE TIME THAT RENEWABLES ARE READILY AVAILABLE.

LET'S LOOK AT THE ILL-CONSIDERED DENIAL TO NRG TO REPOWER ITS GENERATING FACILITY IN ASTORIA, QUEENS, EVEN THOUGH IT WAS CLEARLY DEMONSTRATED THAT NEW 21ST CENTURY TECHONOLOGY WOULD REDUCE EMISSIONS AND KEEP NEW YORK CITY'S GRID RELIABLE.

THIS DECISION CAME UNDER THE GUISE OF SOCIAL JUSTICE, YET WHEN NEW YORKERS BEGIN TO EXPERIENCE ROLLING BROWNOUTS AND BLACKOUTS DURING COLD WINTERS AND SCORCHING SUMMERS, I CAN TELL YOU RIGHT NOW THAT NEW YORKERS WILL DEMAND RELIABLE CURRENT ENERGY RESOURCES WHILE SOCIETY MAKES ITS TRANSITION TO CLEAN ENERGY. THEY WILL NOT BE MOLLIFIED BY ILL-TIMED AND ILL- CONSIDERED PUBLIC POLICY FIATS FROM ON HIGH. AND WITH THE NEW TECHNOLOGY NRG WANTS TO INTRODUCE, THE POTENTIAL INJURY TO THOSE LIVING NEAR THE PLANT WOULD BE GREATLY REDUCED AND, PERHAPS, ELIMINATED.

YOU AND I BOTH KNOW THAT THE PUBLIC - NEW YORKERS - WILL NOT LIVE IN THIRD WORLD CONDITIONS AND YOU AND I BOTH KNOW THAT IT WE DO NOT HAVE A RELIABLE AND PLENTIFUL ENERGY GRID RIGHT NOW, RIGHT THIS MINUTE, WE WILL NEVER MAKE IT TO THE NEXT PHASE. AND THE NEXT PHASE - A CLEAN, SUSTAINABLE, RELIABLE ENERGY GRID - CANNOT COME AT THE EXPENSE OF PEOPLE NOW WORKING TO HEAT YOUR HOMES, COOL YOUR OFFICES AND POWER OUR HOSPITALS.

WE NEED TO INTRODUCE RIGHT NOW TECHNOLOGY SYSTEMS THAT ADDRESS CURRENT AND NEAR-FUTURE POWER NEEDS THROUGH GAS, ELECTRIC, NUCLEAR AND HYDRO POWER GENERATION. THIS IS A GOAL THAT CAN BE MET RIGHT NOW, RATHER THAN CONSIGNING THESE PRODUCERS TO UNNECESSARY AND SHORT-SIGHTED, PREMATURE OBSOLESENCE. WE CANNOT RISK THE BROWNOUTS AND BLACKOUTS WHICH WILL UNQUESTIONABLY RESULT FROM SHUTTING DOWN THE CURRENT PLANTS WITHOUT ANY SUBSTITUTE SYSTEMS AT THE READY.

I CAN TELL YOU THAT MY MEMBERS - THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO KEEP THE LIGHTS ON - ARE READY FOR THIS TASK AND ALREADY ARE TRAINING AND BECOMING EXPERT IN NEW ENERGY TECHNOLOGIES

SO THAT THE DAY A WIND FARM OFF OUR COAST, OUT IN THE ATLANTIC, IS READY TO TIE INTO THE GRID, WE WILL BE READY.

WE KNOW THIS DAY IS COMING BUT WE ALSO KNOW THAT IT WILL NOT ARRIVE FOR YEARS, AND RIGHT NOW WE ARE RUNNING, OR HAVE RUN, OUT OF TIME.

YES, WE NEED IMMEDIATE CHANGE IN HOW WE GRAPPLE WITH THESE REALITIES BUT WE CANNOT JUST TURN-OFF WHAT WE HAVE NOW AND HOPE FOR MAGICAL SOLUTIONS TO APPEAR.

ALREADY WE HAVE SEEN STRAIN FROM THE ABRUPT CLOSING OF INDIAN POINT AND THE REFUSAL TO ALLOW RETROFITTED AND CLEANER OPERATING POWER PLANTS TO GENERATE POWER.

THE RESULT OF THESE ACTIONS, AS EVERY NEW YORKER KNOWS, HAS BEEN SOARING ENERGY COSTS HITTING EVERY POCKET BOOK; AND WE KNOW THAT THOSE MOST ADVERSELY AFFECTED BY THIS ARE THE POOR, THOSE LEAST ABLE TO AFFORD SOLAR PANELING AND OTHER NEW TECHNOLOGIES FOR THEIR HOMES IN A CHANGING ENERGY LANDSCAPE, LET ALONE SWEEPING UNILATERAL UNCOUPLING OF CURRENT POWER GENERATION WHEN WE CAN LEAST AFFORD IT.

IF WE ARE WISE, WE CAN AND MUST USE WHAT WE HAVE NOW WHILE AT THE SAME TIME BUILDING A NEW GRID FOR THE FUTURE. WE NEED TO KEEP THE ELECTRICITY AND GAS FLOWING WHILE WE WAIT FOR THE NEW TECHNOLOGY TO BE AVAILABLE.

WE AGREE THAT IT IS FAR PAST THE TIME TO ACT; AND AS A PROFESSIONAL UTILITY WORKER, I CAN TELL YOU MYSELF AND MY MEMBERS HAVE BEEN SAYING THIS FOR YEARS.

TODAY WE HOPE YOU MIGHT LISTEN TO US SO THAT ALL NEW YORKERS CAN AVOID A DRASTIC CALAMITY IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

IT IS A BIG PUZZLE, BUT WE ARE UP TO THE TASK. FOR A BETTER ENERGY FUTURE, PLEASE LISTEN TO US. WE WILL KEEP YOUR LIGHTS ON TO SHOW YOU THE WAY, BUT WE NEED TO KEEP GENERATING POWER – USING CLEANER TECHNOLOGY IN OUR CURRENT PLANTS – UNTIL WE REACH THAT FUTURE. DO NOT FALL PREY TO FALSE SOLUTIONS, OR ELSE THE LOSSES TO OUR ECONOMY AND WAY OF LIVING WILL BE STAGGERING.

SHOP STEWARD TOOLBOX

Your Duties as a Shop Steward

No one can list all the different duties you'll be asked to perform. What follows are some of the more important things UWUA stewards do. You don't have to learn your duties all at once. And you'll have more experienced stewards and staff reps to help you get started.

- Get to know all the workers in your unit.
- Greet new members and help them get oriented. Play a leading role in unit meetings. Keep the members informed.
- Help out with balloting, elections, and reports.
- Get involved in committees and attend committee meetings, guiding them when need be.

- Keep updated phone, addresses and email lists of your members.
- Learn all the problems in the workplace.
- Investigate grievances.
- Interview Members.
- Write and file grievances. Help negotiate with management, never make any deal without first talking to your Business Agent.



CHICAGO, IL (MARCH 7, 2022) – The Utility Workers Military Assistance Program (UMAP) today celebrated the 700th veteran graduate in Chicago. UMAP – which is administered together with the Utility Workers Union of America (UWUA), UWUA Local 18007 and Peoples Gas at City Colleges of Chicago – offers service members a pathway into a family-supporting career.

"It's truly remarkable to think about all of the lives we've impacted through UMAP including veterans, their spouses and families," said UWUA President James Slevin. "This public-private partnership in Chicago sparked an idea that has become a dynamic, national program that expanded to include employer partnerships across the country."

Beyond career opportunities, UMAP offers wrap-around support services that help veterans focus on their studies and benefit their families. With help from community organizations including the Dixon Center and Women for Wounded Warriors, UMAP provides grocery and gas gift cards, childcare and more.

"The contributions veterans have made to our organization through this program have met and exceeded all expectations," said Charles Matthews, president and CEO of Peoples Gas. "As a founding partner in UMAP, we are proud to have built an ongoing program that is making a tangible, positive difference in the communities we serve."

UMAP students earn 52 credits and an associate degree. The six-month, training-to-placement program has a 95 percent job placement rate with Peoples Gas.

"UMAP – which we built from the ground up and launched in 2012 – has made an immeasurable impact," said UWUA Director of Veterans Affairs and Workforce Development Rick Passarelli. "Coming out of the military over 15 years ago, I faced many of the same challenges those graduating today faced. I'm proud to help guide service members into new careers and show the great opportunities that exist in the utility sector."

Graduation ceremony speakers Colonel Sam Whitehurst, vice president of programs and services at Dixon Center for Military and Veterans Services and Chicago Alderman Gilbert Villegas congratulated service members for their hard work and determination to fulfill the program requirements and join the Peoples Gas workforce as gas technicians.

"Congratulations to UWUA and UMAP on creating a successful program that's made a difference for so many veterans," said U.S. Secretary of Labor Marty Walsh. "This program's success is a reflection of hard work by a small group of individuals who are dedicated to seeing our veterans achieve a meaningful career with family sustaining wages. 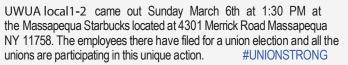

UWUA Scholarship Program

2022 Utility Workers Union of America Scholarship Program

Beginning in 2022, the Utility Workers Union of America, AFL-CIO (UWUA) established a scholarship program in an effort to promote the solidarity of its members and encourage educational growth of the future generations of our labor organization.

Entry Eligibility:

High school seniors who are the son or daughter of an active UWUA member. Year of Eligibility:

Students are eligible for entry into the scholarship drawing during the scholarship year that coincides with their graduation from high school, i.e., 2022 Scholarship/2022 High School Graduation.

How to Enter:

Each year, there will be a drawing for each region (Regions I, II, III, IV & V) for a \$2,000 scholarship, with the exception of the National Convention year, in which there will be one drawing for a \$10,000 scholarship. To be entered into the scholarship drawing, the student must submit a scholarship entry form to the National Union for the year of the scholarship/high school graduation by April 15th.

For 2022, the deadline to submit an entry form is extended to 7/30/2022.

Selection of Award Recipients:

Recipients will be selected at the spring National Executive Board meeting each year. For 2022, the recipients will be selected at the fall National Executive Board meeting. The drawing is a blind drawing from all of the eligible entry forms submitted. Recipients will be recognized in the year selected.

Amount of the Award:

For non-convention years, an award for \$2,000 will be made to one student from each of the five regions. For convention years, one award for \$10,000 will be made to one student.

Requirements for Payment of the Award

Recipients will receive the scholarship upon proof of acceptance and attendance at any university, college, or trade school, etc.

Local 1-2 Scholarshin

\$1,000 Scholarship Available to Children of Union Members

College-bound children of current Local 1-2 Members who are in good standing are eligible to compete for \$1,000 Joseph Caradonna Scholarship under the Union's annual scholarship competition.

The program provides a scholarship grant, each in the amount of \$1,000, to be used toward the payment of college tuition and books.

"By offering these scholarships, we are investing in our children and in the future. We consider that a wise and prudent investment. We urge all eligible students to participate in this contest," the Local's President James Shillitto said.

To qualify as a candidate, a student must be a child of a Local 1-2 Member and be a high school Senior graduating in 2022. The scholarship will be paid only to those who have declared their intention to enroll or are already enrolled in a post-high school institution certified by the Department of Education in the state where-the-institution-is-located.

Applications (see below) must be completed and mailed to:

UWUA Local 1-2 AFL-CIO 5 West. 37th Street, 7th Floor New York, NY 10018. **Attention Scholarship**

All applications must be accompanied by a copy of the official transcript of high school grades covering the first six terms.

The deadline for filing is: All applications must be postmarked by June 20, 2022.

After the initial application step, the next phase of the competition is, the scholarship candidates will be required to write an essay of 350 words or more and forwarded to the Union office on a date to be announced. The topic of the essay will be revealed in a letter sent to the home of the students competing for the scholarships.

Members themselves, brothers and sisters of Members and the children of full-time Union Officers are excluded from participating in the contest. The winners will be chosen based on their school transcript records and the written essays.

Winners will be notified by mail sometime in late August and will receive their scholarships at Local 1-2's first General Membership Meeting, usually held in September.

The deadline is approaching fast so, please complete the application on the following page, get a copy of your high school transcript and send in the material as quickly as possible.

Union Plus Mortgage Veteran's Grant

Eligibility Guidelines and Instuctions

The Union Plus Mortgage Program's Veteran's Grant will provide you with a one-time grant of \$1,000 to offset the cost of your home purchase. You may be eligible for a Veteran's Grant after you close on your Union Plus mortgage if:

- a) The Union Plus mortgage loan was used to purchase your primary residence
- b) **You or your eligible cosigner are a veteran** (as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau) of the United States Armed Forces
- c) You or your eligible cosigner are a member of a union that participates in the Union Plus Mortgage Program
- d) You submit your application for a Veteran's Grant no later than 90 days after the closing date of your Union Plus mortgage

To demonstrate eligibility for a Veteran's Grant, you must submit a completed Union Plus Mortgage Veteran's Grant Application, a copy of a valid DD-214 and a completed W-9 form² within 90 days of closing on a mortgage through the Union Plus Mortgage Program. The DD-214 must clearly show "Discharge", "Release from Active Duty" or "Retirement". You may only receive a Veteran's Grant once in your lifetime. You will not be eligible to receive multiple Veteran's Grants if both you and your eligible cosigner are veterans of the United States Armed Forces. The grant will be paid directly to you.

Important Additional Information

- Only active and retired members, who are veterans of the United States Armed Services and members of unions that participate¹ in the Union Plus Mortgage Program are eligible for this grant (parents, children, spouses of union members and fee payers are not eligible). Union members who served in the National Guard or Reserve are eligible only if they were called to active duty, not counting the 4 - 6 months for initial training or yearly summer camps.
- All applications are subject to verification of membership in a participating union
- All information on the application must be completed unless labeled "Optional". <u>Applications</u>
 with missing information will not be processed. Please be sure to print all information on the
 application.
- You must submit the application and supporting documents on your own. An application submitted on your behalf by any third party will not be accepted.
- Normal processing time for grant checks is 60 days after receipt of a complete grant application package. Additional processing time may be required to confirm your Union Plus Mortgage loan or verify your union membership.

¹The majority of AFL-CIO affiliated unions and some Change to Win unions participate in Union Plus Mortgage. **Members of independent unions**, which are not affiliated with the AFL-CIO or Change to Win unions **are not eligible**. **If it is determined**, **at any point in the application process, that the union to which you belong <u>does not participate</u>, you will be deemed ineligible for the grant.**

²Grants valued at \$600 or more may be considered taxable income by the Internal Revenue Service. Therefore, a Form 1099-MISC tax reporting form will be issued to each recipient of a grant valued at \$600 or more.
