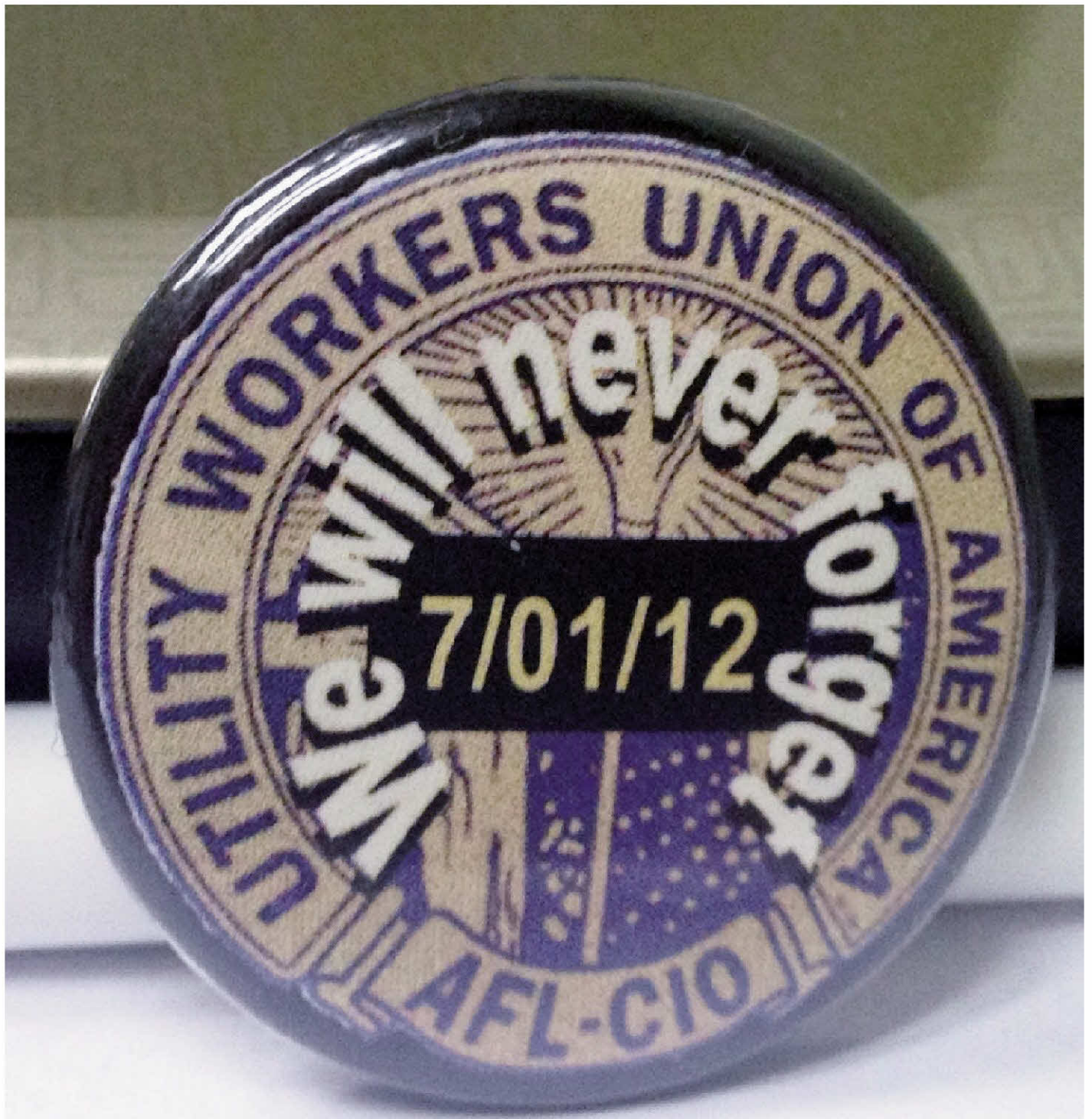
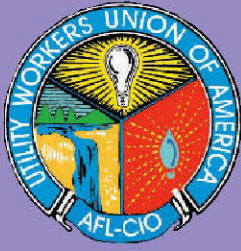

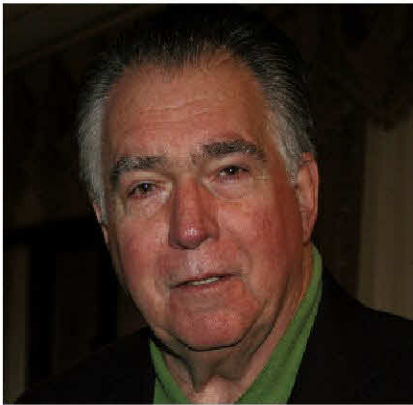

FROM THE DESK OF

Brothers and Sisters, before we meet again but after you read this, we will have elected a President of the United States. The outcome of the 2012 election will map the destiny of the Labor Movement in this country. The stakes are stark and the choice will be long-lasting. And if we choose against our own best interests, then we might be nailing shut Labor's coffin in America. This is why all of us MUST vote on November 6 and vote for President Obama. If you're dazzled by some of Mitt Romney's "God, guts and guns" BS or the Republicans' focus on peripheral social issues that have nothing to do with the presidency, then consider what we say next. FROM THE DESK OF

One item that emerged from our new CBA which will help us increase our ranks in Local 1-2 is the provision that for every four employees in our bargaining unit who leave Con Edison, the Company has to hire three employees into Local 1-2 jobs. While this might not end attrition in our unit, it will certainly slow it down.

We all know that Con Ed over the past decade, especially, has purposely not hired to replace lost employees from Local 1-2. We all know the contractors have become de facto employees, without the messiness of being Local 1-2 members. And we all know that Con Ed wants nothing more than to have Local 1-2 disappear forever.

So, two of the weapons we have in the new CBA are the three out of four jobs provision and the

addition of a contracting committee, with an independent member who can give thumbs up or thumbs down to an outside contractor. We have proved time and again to Con Ed that Local 1-2 Members can do these contractor jobs faster, safer, ahead of time and under budget. Just look at the Harlem Tunnel project last year.

We intend to use these weapons vigorously to keep Con Ed honest, to grow our Local and to push contractors off Con Ed properties.

But the Bosses are playing the long game of attrition, watching our Membership shrink over the decades. They have the money to wait us out.

Brothers and Sisters, in the past year alone we have lost nearly 1,000 dues paying Members to retirements, quits and firings. That is the \$800,000 hole you see in our financial statements. The good news is that Local 1-2 is financially strong and solvent-for the time being. But this loss of Members has severely constrained the Local's ability to represent you. Think of your dues like car insurance. The majority of us never need to call on the Union to defend us just as the majority of

us never need to call on our car insurance company to represent us in an accident.

Post Lockout, some Members have been calling for a dedicated Members' strike fund that would pay a stipend to Members in the event of a work disruption. We already have a strike fund to sustain the Union during such events, and we used it during the Lockout to pay for printing, rallies, lawyers, subject matter experts, office space and hotel costs for 24-hour negotiating - and we had money left over. That's where the current defense fund gets spent. Imagine, if we were to implement a stipend fund for Members, your dues would skyrocket and be unsustainable.

Imagine then that \$800,000 annual hole, created by the loss of dues, is what it would cost each WEEK to provide a Members' stipend fund with just \$100 per member, per week. That's \$800,000 a week, and in an extended labor dispute - like July 2012 for example - the sound you would hear would be the Local's total assets being sucked down the drain. (con't...)

It does not seem now we could ask the Members to pay into such a fund. It would be unsustainable from the start.

As it is, Local 1-2 has not had a dues increase in three decades. Yes, our dues have increased in that time, but that is from the National, although some of that comes back to Local 1-2. But over the years we have gone from 18 business agents to half that. Fortunately, the majority of Members do not have to call on their Agent to represent them before the Bosses. Yet for the Members who do need a hand, nine people going in all directions can be stretched to the limit.

That said, there have been a staggering number of workplace injuries following our return to

work after the Lockout. Brothers and Sisters we cannot stress enough the concept of working safe, which means working to your contract. If we are going to remain strong and united you must use the protections of the contract and not just cave to your Bosses' demands. If the Bosses want you to do something which is unsafe, immediately call a TIME OUT. Don't leave a yard, don't pick up a tool, and don't do anything unless it's strictly by the book. This is one way, you, as an individual Member, can be sure you comply with the Bosses' "Rules We Live By" and avoid getting into problems. It is up to each and everyone one of us. Don't let management force you to do anything that is unsafe or contrary to the "Rules We Live By". That's how you stay safe and your Union

gets stronger, so please do it.

Finally, as we saw at the September Membership Meeting, there are always some fringe elements trying to create chaos for the Membership - just because they can - by making "me, me, me" adolescent demands. But if you're like us and looking to 2016 and our next major contract with our largest employer and to the expiration dates of all our other contracts from now until then, then you have a responsibility to ask what you can do for your Union. Let's learn the lesson of the Lockout and recommit to Unity. Do not get lost on the fringes of the herd. Come to the Membership Meetings, support your Union. We all know that APATHY IS LETHAL!

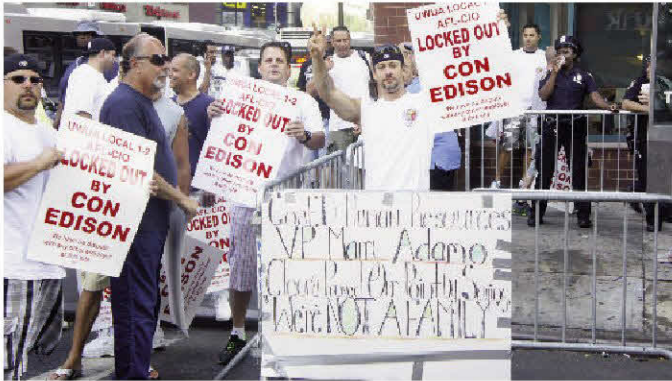

Unions support Local 1-2.

LaborPress spoke again to John Melia, Local 1-2's spokesman as well as Ken Margolies, senior associate at the Worker Institute at the ILR School of Cornell University to assess some of the details of the tentative agreement reached between Local 1-2 of the Utility Workers Union of America and Con Edison...

Melia said recently that it's mathematically possible for new hires to end up with more in retirement. Margolies noted that Melia is probably right, that it is mathematically possible, but it would depend on the amount of contributions from the workers and the company plus how those funds are invested. Participants in such plans usually have a choice of investment vehicles, i.e., stocks, bonds, money market and growth funds Margolies believes Con Edison underestimated two factors. It probably believed the union would cave, but didn't. And it didn't expect that the city's other unions would have been as active as they were, which ultimately contributed to the political pressure placed on Con Edison....

"A lot of the politicians are pro-labor, but they wouldn't have been as involved if they didn't see all of labor get behind the utility workers. The fact that the state AFL-CIO federation and the central labor council made it a priority made it possible for the union to get the political support."...

Regarding the provision in the tentative agreement that calls for three out of every four new hires to be union positions, Margolies said, "In order to evaluate this, you would have had to know how many non-bargaining unit jobs they were creating and how many they planned to create in the future as compared to what they can now do under the negotiated formula. Since prior to this agreement the company essentially was doing what it wanted in that regard, getting a guarantee that they will create more bargaining unit jobs is definitely an improvement."...

"It's a sign of the lack of strength that unions have as compared to the past. They're holding onto as much as they can. One possible outcome could have been that the union folded and agreed to all concessions the company was seeking. When you weigh it against that worst-case scenario, this outcome is far from that. The best-case scenario would have been if the company settled without getting any concessions. So the actual outcome is somewhere in between. In order to resist the enormous pressure for concessions unions must plan way ahead and build campaigns that convince employers it is not worth taking on the fight."

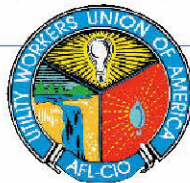
